A Teaching Congregation

This congregation has long been a "Teaching Congregation", training Student Ministers. The congregation also had a Music Intern, Alison Reid (now Alison Plante), in 2002-2003. At several times in our history, ministerial students have actually been the Minister of the church. A few months ago the Rev. Olav Nieuwejaar attended a Memorial Service at the church. He had served here as minister in the course of his training at Tufts, and recalled living briefly in the parsonage when it was newly constructed. Another student who served as minister for a few years was the late Brandoch (Brandy) Lovely, who based part of his book, A Machiavellian View of the Ministry, on his experience here! The Rev. Woody Widrick, now minister emeritus, and I have been supervisors and mentors of many students, working with the theological schools to provide opportunities for seminarians to learn as well as to serve, while you the congregation have been their teachers..

I hope we will have a Student Minister working with us this fall. We expect to restore the stipend to our budget. In the meantime, here are updates from our most recent students.

**Linda Simmons** was Student Minister 2009-2010 and is working part time with us this church year. Linda has been invited to be the Candidate for the Ministry of the Unitarian Universalist Meetinghouse of Nantucket, and will spend ten days with that congregation this spring. Linda will be ordained on Saturday, May 4<sup>th</sup> at First Church in Boston, 66 Marlborough Street at 2:30 PM. All are invited. Watch for carpool signups closer to the date.

## Message from the Director of Religious Education

In 2004, when Tim Jensen was our minister, we presented the UU Pageant I and II on the same Sunday. This year we chose to separate them into two services; both multigenerational, but the first one presented on March 17 geared more for older youth and adults, and the second one coming up on April 28 to involve and engage all ages. These Pageants are an integral part of our RE theme for this year of Unitarian Universalism. We look for ways to present our UU history in a way that is both fun and memorable. Clara Barton a Universalist hero and founder of the American Red Cross, (Ann Quenin in a drop dead gorgeous costume provided by the talented Kathy Booth) on a recent Sunday talked to the children of her role during the Civil war and beyond to bring medical supplies and aid to both soldiers and victims of natural disasters. Henry Thoreau (Joe Jancek) and Ralph Waldo Emerson (Tom Rourk) will also visit our church children this spring to talk of what they did in their lives long ago to make them UU heroes.

We try to balance the need for “Sunday School classes” along with the request of many parents to provide hand-on opportunities for children to participate in real community service projects. Plans for April include a field trip to a Carlisle organic farm, preparing for and performing the story of UU Hero John Murray, and a field trip to the Heifer Project Overlook Farm in Rutland, MA. All money collected from the Easter egg hunt will go to the Heifer project, so this family friendly field trip becomes a learning experience on many levels and for all ages.

The RE Committee and I are committed to providing a rich and engaging program each Sunday, even though the numbers in our RE classes are currently very small. We must seek out ways to encourage new families to join us, perhaps by expanding our offerings to other days of the week? If you have any thoughts on say a series of Wednesday evening potluck suppers with an open mic for children and drumming or singing lessons, please talk to me about it!


