**“Dianiana” Reflections on Ministry by Rev. Diane Miller**

On a glorious fall day I took a walk at the Cranberry Bog with parishioners. One commented that he loved to eat raw cranberries. He wasn't joking. Eww, I thought, aren't they so bitter and sour that the only way they are palatable is doused with sweetener? Mark Bittman's "How to Cook Everything" compendium states that cranberries are "too hard and astringent to be eaten out of hand, so they are always cooked or combined with other ingredients." So I have long been tutored, and cook them up with sugar.

At the Carlisle bog the cranberries had been harvested, but there were lots of them left in the grass along the edge of the bog. We picked up a handful, and I braced for a harsh bitterness when I put one in my mouth. To my surprise, it was not unpleasant at all! It was slightly crunchy, juicy, and tart, but less astringent than a lemon. Thinking it might have been an exception, I tried another. Excellent. If I'd had a basket with me I would have gleaned more.

The walk at the bog turned into one of those moments when habit, expectation, and conventional wisdom are overthrown by actual experience. I gained a new perspective and appreciation for the cranberry.

You may have seen an ad placed in the Carlisle Mosquito for October 26<sup>th</sup>, asking "Are You One of the Nones?" It was the idea of Michael Dundorf, who read the reports that increasingly Americans, when asked to identify their religion from a list of options, select "None." None of the above. No religious affiliation. Nones.

I wonder how many people look upon church the way I did raw cranberries – hard, astringent, unpalatable, and definitely not something they would try for themselves. Would they think differently if they gave it a try? Would they discover that this congregation is juicy, crunchy, and good for you in an enjoyable way? I hope that you will encourage your friends and neighbors to visit the First Religious Society and see for themselves.

## Message from the Director of Religious Education

Congratulations to the K-2 class for selling organic seeds harvested from the Infinity Garden and raising \$57.25; to the 3-4 class for selling bags of lego and grape jelly harvested from the Saylor's yard and made into jelly by the MacDonald family and their friends, raising \$73.00; to the Junior Youth Group for making fresh cider in a hand-crank cider press borrowed from Gillian Teixeira (Alison's sister) and fresh popcorn using Aaron Schaefer's popcorn machine, raising \$150.35, and to the Senior Youth Group under John Redding's guidance who helped Bill Mersch to raise \$700 for Habitat for Humanity of Greater Lowell. Much learning goes into the planning, execution and follow-up work associated with this endeavor, as after the Harvest Fair the K-2 and 3-4 class research and discuss where the money will be donated.

The Junior Youth Group raised money for the Concord Crop Walk on the afternoon of 10/14 and walked both loops of the organized walk. Look for their creative banner to be on display first on the pulpit, and later on a wall in Union Hall.

The Senior Youth Group raised money for the Habitat for Humanity of Greater Lowell on the afternoon of 10/14 and Bob and Peter Fox, John Redding and Alison, Mike and Gavin Saylor hiked 5 miles in Lowell stopping to hear short talks at the Hindu Temple Swaminarayan, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Temple Emanuel of the Merrimack Valley, Calvary Baptist Church, and the Merrimack Valley Food Bank.

The Senior Youth Group are all invited to the Guy Fawkes event on Saturday November 3 where one topic of conversation around the cooking fire will be the age old and often told story of the unfortunate Guy Fawkes, one of the many victims of the Protestant vs Catholic vindictive waves of violence throughout British history. Guy Fawkes masks are apparently worn by some Occupy groups as they find mysterious parallels to his exploits.
