



### Message from the Minister

A friend of mine made a comment in conversation. “I must spend half an hour every day just putting things where they go,” she said. My initial reaction was, “That’s a lot of time out of every day devoted to putting things away.” Then I came to my senses and realized that I easily spend more than half an hour a day putting things away and that’s just basics, like dishes and groceries and laundry and recycling. I spend a lot of time putting stuff away at FRS as well. Putting things where they go is not something I intrinsically value, but I do like being able to find things when I need them. So I began observing when I put stuff away and when I avoided putting things in order. For one thing, it is easier to put things away when there is a known place to put them (duh!). It is easier when putting things away is routine, a ritual of daily living. It is easier when I acknowledge that I am going to spend time doing it and don’t assume I have better things to do.

In my quest of a more ordered life, I started by redoing the kitchen cupboards in the parsonage. It took more time than I expected. I weeded out what I haven’t been using. I made trips to pick up cup hooks and shelf liner and dividers. I got the spices organized. It became easier to put things away. The following week included a wedding and a sermon to prepare for guest preaching, and meetings to attend. The kitchen cabinets may be as far as I get this summer, and now my effort is to stay ahead of kitchen entropy. I learned something about changing my habits. It takes effort, time, attention, focus and repetition. And it is good to derive some satisfaction from the doing of it as well as from the having done it. I have accomplished more at other times in my life, but this bit of nesting has readied me for the busy times ahead and, in fact, is helping me put away my summer pace and move into the excitement of the new church year. ## **Message from the Director of Religious Education**

As the new Director of Religious Education (DRE) I am excited to share my vision for the Religious Education program at the First Religious Society in Carlisle. The five major components of our Unitarian Universalist RE program are

- **Worship**
- **Community**
- **Education**
- **Social Action**
- **Environmental Action**

Spiritual growth and core moral development will naturally happen as we work together on hands-on meaningful tasks to better ourselves, our community and our world. The best learning comes from multi-sensory experiences, so we will do lots of story telling and drama with a variety of fun intergenerational activities that utilize all forms of creative arts in support of these five core areas. Volunteer teaching teams will lead each class; K-2, 3-5, Junior Youth Group, 8<sup>th</sup> grade OWL, with a Senior Youth Group Advisor, Bucky Rogers, organizing the Senior Youth Group team and grade 10-12 OWL.

My four children have gone through the RE Program and I have been a Nursery coordinator, assistant teacher, lead teacher, Junior Youth leader, RE Committee member, RE chair, field trip driver, Pageant Director...in other words I have first hand knowledge of the past and current Religious Education program at FRS. I hope to use this experience to tweak the program, not make any unnecessary dramatic changes.

I will work from home as well as from my office in the ground floor conference room where all the RE books and curricula are stored. The books are available for anyone to borrow, and I encourage you to take advantage of this rich resource.

While the RE Committee sets policy, budgets, and creates special events, it is the DRE who administers the program and facilitates communication between parents, teachers, church committees, and the community. Please call or e-mail me with questions, suggestions, concerns, or ideas.

## **Message from the Student Minister**

When I was a sophomore in college, I decided that I was going to run a marathon. I based my training on a schedule that had been put together at the advent of the modern era of popular marathoning. The London marathon was run for the first time in 1981; to prepare first-time runners, a columnist for the Times of London had assembled a manageable-looking table of the minutes you had to run each day for three months leading up to it if you wanted to be able to complete it. I started hitting the treadmill four times a week. I watched dreck like MTV at the gym while I did my best to keep up an eight-minute-per-mile speed.

Around finals time, and then again in the summer, I hit a wall and could not find the time or the stamina to cross the one hour barrier. I set a personal record in the 5K distance but 40K (a marathon) seemed perpetually out of reach.

Not much changed in this pattern until I left college and was living in Berkeley. I read a New York Times piece about interspersing your runs with periods of walking. It claimed this was an effective method for increasing the distances you could run with safety and comfort. People can make fun of me (and many have) for getting drawn into watching sports easily. But getting caught up in a soccer tournament on the fields I was running around at Berkeley High was how I turned the corner as a distance runner. There was a Korean league having its playoffs one afternoon that I just could not look away from. I kept walking and running around the track until they were done. Before I knew it, I had been there for two hours- adding the distance to and from my house put me over a half-marathon for the day.

Now, when I say “it’s a marathon not a sprint”, what I mean is that you get to walk in some parts. This summer I did a bit of mental walking- I read novels instead of history books and listened to comedy podcasts instead of NPR. For the first time since I matriculated at divinity school, my brain began to ask for more intellectual content instead of less. That’s how I know it was a good rest and that I am ready to return to school and church life refreshed and renewed. I hope that you each got some time to mentally walk it out this summer, too.

On Saturday evening, 7 PM in Union Hall, he will present "The Struggle of LGBT Rights in Uganda." His congregation is one of the few in Uganda that affirms gay persons. Mark organized a Conference, "Standing On the Side of Love" in 2010 in opposition to the 2009 Anti-Homosexuality Bill that would imprison or execute gay persons and people who protect them. The legislation was proposed after visits from US evangelists who fanned the anti-gay attitudes of the country. There will be an opportunity for questions and conversation. ## Message from the Student Minister

I was not even three hours into my internship last year when I learned about The Sharing Foundation. Members of the Social Action Committee brought me pictures and correspondence from Vuthea, the high school student our Senior Youth Group was writing to. "Elephant is coming!" they proclaimed - the Cambodian director's nickname left me a mite confused. This much was obvious: First Religious Society has a deep and lasting connection with The Sharing Foundation (TSF), of which we are rightly proud.

The Sharing Foundation has now been active in three decades. It was founded by FRS member Nancy Hendrie. This year, Sally Stokes, another FRS member, has taken over the presidency from Nancy. All of its paid staff are in Cambodia- having a board comprised of volunteers makes it able to use donations very efficiently to help the students and orphans in Cambodia. It serves 1,500 children daily through its elementary schools, student tuition sponsorships, computer school, sewing school and farming cooperative. I am inspired by the mission-driven efficacy of this organization and hope to be able to incorporate similar efforts into my parish ministry in the future.

The connection between FRS and TSF is the kind of unexpected opportunity that makes me light up when I think about prospective work I can do in ministry. I have known since I first planned to enter ministry that Unitarian Universalism has a unique capacity amongst modern religions to foster international connections. The acceptance promoted by the seven principles and universalist spirit of our forebears gives us a good lens for seeing into a pluralistic future, unencumbered by narrow dogma.

Too often, however, this openness to everything leaves us with no deep connection to anything. That is why I find the FRS-TSF connection so gratifying- there is genuine exchange and support happening through it!

In the earlier times the Verger served the role of silently assisting in the preparation and conduct of the service. His/Her duties included helping to prepare the logistic details of the service by making ready the sanctuary (candles, pews, hymnals and other items of liturgy) and responding to the requirements of the Minister. Tom Rourk notes that duties also included rousing somnambulant parishioners and disciplining errant choristers. While we will not be beating choir members or chastising those who might be snoring, we will be continuing to perform our traditional function.

**Environmental Action Committee News:** The Environmental Action Committee (EAC) last year sponsored the Carlisle Winter Farmer's Market for monthly Saturday mornings in Union Hall. The goal was to support local, sustainable food and crafts year round. Thanks to a successful winter season, the Farmer's Market group was able to contribute \$250 from their table fees to the EAC. The EAC staffed a table each month selling fair trade coffee and chocolate, local honey, and other items, along with having the "coffee concession." **Social Action Committee News:** A message from Julia Lyons about her involvement in the Virginia Service Project: *Note: Julia and her sister Chrissy are second generation FRSers. Their parents are Helen and John. Appalachian Volunteers is a Boston College program. Look on the SAC bulletin board in Union Hall for two photos from Julia's trip.*

"Entering my senior year at Boston College, I have now participated in four service trips with the Appalachia Volunteers program during spring break or in late summer. These trips have taken me to a depressed coal mining town in Pennsylvania (Waynesburg), an unincorporated "holler" in the mountains of West Virginia devastated by natural gas mining and mountain top removal (Jacksonburg), and twice to the impoverished Eastern Shore town of Exmore, Virginia, where the locals live under the thumb of the wealthy, ocean-front residents. Each of these experiences has been incredibly eye-opening and rewarding. In August, I returned to Exmore for the second time, to help run a day camp for the local children, held in a local church's parking lot. In a community only three hours from our nation's capital, extended families live in dilapidated homes that consist of only one or two rooms, and lack running water, heat, and electricity. A trench extended along each road serves as a sewer, and each home is equipped with an outhouse.

Our purpose for the week was to provide the children with positive role models, while keeping them out of trouble. In reality, we learn just as much from the children as they do from us. Most of these children will never have the opportunity to leave the Eastern Shore. We hope to plant a seed in them of the importance of education. Our local contact, Mama Jane, has told us many times that these children look forward to the Boston College students' arrival. The children are unbelievably caring and kind, despite their circumstances.

I would like to thank the Social Action Committee for their support, which helped us provide the children with breakfast and lunch during our visit, and supplies such as sidewalk chalk, jump ropes, and basketballs that they can continue to play with throughout the year. It has been an incredible opportunity to spend time with these children, and it has helped me realize my goal of working in social action in the future."

### Message from the Minister

Church life is full of contrast, and one is the shift from quiet stillness to bustling activity. We have made the shift into the busier times at the First Religious Society. Something is going on most of the time. On a recent Saturday night I went by quite late to carry over some things I wanted set up for the Sunday morning service. Even at the witching hour I heard activity – Bryan Sorrows had come by late to make sure that heat would come on for the nursery and classrooms.

From the parsonage next to the church I see cars coming and going, and the lights turned on and off at all hours for the scheduled activities and the ongoing care people give to the space we use for worship, classes, music, social time, service and social action.

There is an enduring image of quiet church buildings, dust motes in a shaft of light, a place for meditation and reflection in solitude. You can still find it at times, but not often. The church is full of life and activity from all ages, including tap dancing (thundering noise below decks) and musical rehearsals filling up every available space. Sundays have been glad reunions full of greetings and lots of children and much liveliness. Come by and be part of the mix.

## Message from the Student Minister

I was not even three hours into my internship last year when I learned about The Sharing Foundation. Members of the Social Action Committee brought me pictures and correspondence from Vuthea, the high school student our Senior Youth Group was writing to. "Elephant is coming!" they proclaimed - the Cambodian director's nickname left me a mite confused. This much was obvious: First Religious Society has a deep and lasting connection with The Sharing Foundation (TSF), of which we are rightly proud.

The Sharing Foundation has now been active in three decades. It was founded by FRS member Nancy Hendrie. This year, Sally Stokes, another FRS member, has taken over the presidency from Nancy. All of its paid staff are in Cambodia- having a board comprised of volunteers makes it able to use donations very efficiently to help the students and orphans in Cambodia. It serves 1,500 children daily through its elementary schools, student tuition sponsorships, computer school, sewing school and farming cooperative. I am inspired by the mission-driven efficacy of this organization and hope to be able to incorporate similar efforts into my parish ministry in the future.

The connection between FRS and TSF is the kind of unexpected opportunity that makes me light up when I think about prospective work I can do in ministry. I have known since I first planned to enter ministry that Unitarian Universalism has a unique capacity amongst modern religions to foster international connections. The acceptance promoted by the seven principles and universalist spirit of our forebears gives us a good lens for seeing into a pluralistic future, unencumbered by narrow dogma.

Too often, however, this openness to everything leaves us with no deep connection to anything. That is why I find the FRS-TSF connection so gratifying- there is genuine exchange and support happening through it!

**Social Action Committee News:** A message from Julia Lyons about her involvement in the Virginia Service Project: *Note: Julia and her sister Chrissy are second generation FRSers. Their parents are Helen and John. Appalachian Volunteers is a Boston College program. Look on the SAC bulletin board in Union Hall for two photos from Julia's trip.*

"Entering my senior year at Boston College, I have now participated in four service trips with the Appalachia Volunteers program during spring break or in late summer. These trips have taken me to a depressed coal mining town in Pennsylvania (Waynesburg), an unincorporated "holler" in the mountains of West Virginia devastated by natural gas mining and mountain top removal (Jacksonburg), and twice to the impoverished Eastern Shore town of Exmore, Virginia, where the locals live under the thumb of the wealthy, ocean-front residents. Each of these experiences has been incredibly eye-opening and rewarding. In August, I returned to Exmore for the second time, to help run a day camp for the local children, held in a local church's parking lot. In a community only three hours from our nation's capital, extended families live in dilapidated homes that consist of only one or two rooms, and lack running water, heat, and electricity. A trench extended along each road serves as a sewer, and each home is equipped with an outhouse.

Our purpose for the week was to provide the children with positive role models, while keeping them out of trouble. In reality, we learn just as much from the children as they do from us. Most of these children will never have the opportunity to leave the Eastern Shore. We hope to plant a seed in them of the importance of education. Our local contact, Mama Jane, has told us many times that these children look forward to the Boston College students' arrival. The children are unbelievably caring and kind, despite their circumstances.

I would like to thank the Social Action Committee for their support, which helped us provide the children with breakfast and lunch during our visit, and supplies such as sidewalk chalk, jump ropes, and basketballs that they can continue to play with throughout the year. It has been an incredible opportunity to spend time with these children, and it has helped me realize my goal of working in social action in the future."

## Message from the Director of Religious Education

## Message from the Student Minister

I was not even three hours into my internship last year when I learned about The Sharing Foundation. Members of the Social Action Committee brought me pictures and correspondence from Vuthea, the high school student our Senior Youth Group was writing to. "Elephant is coming!" they proclaimed - the Cambodian director's nickname left me a mite confused. This much was obvious: First Religious Society has a deep and lasting connection with The Sharing Foundation (TSF), of which we are rightly proud.

The Sharing Foundation has now been active in three decades. It was founded by FRS member Nancy Hendrie. This year, Sally Stokes, another FRS member, has taken over the presidency from Nancy. All of its paid staff are in Cambodia- having a board comprised of volunteers makes it able to use donations very efficiently to help the students and orphans in Cambodia. It serves 1,500 children daily through its elementary schools, student tuition sponsorships, computer school, sewing school and farming cooperative. I am inspired by the mission-driven efficacy of this organization and hope to be able to incorporate similar efforts into my parish ministry in the future.

The connection between FRS and TSF is the kind of unexpected opportunity that makes me light up when I think about prospective work I can do in ministry. I have known since I first planned to enter ministry that Unitarian Universalism has a unique capacity amongst modern religions to foster international connections. The acceptance promoted by the seven principles and universalist spirit of our forebears gives us a good lens for seeing into a pluralistic future, unencumbered by narrow dogma.

Too often, however, this openness to everything leaves us with no deep connection to anything. That is why I find the FRS-TSF connection so gratifying- there is genuine exchange and support happening through it!

It features the same inclusive and reasoned values that brought you to Junior High OWL, with age-appropriate material for high school students. The first class will be Sunday, Oct. 2nd from 7-9pm at First Parish Bedford (75 Great Rd in Bedford) where all subsequent classes will held on the first Sunday of the month from 7-9. **Verger;** At the bottom of your order of service you will notice that the cumbersome term "Music and Worship Committee Co-ordinator" has been replaced by the simpler and wonderfully antiquated word "Verger." In the earlier times the Verger served the role of silently assisting in the preparation and conduct of the service. His/Her duties included helping to prepare the logistic details of the service by making ready the sanctuary (candles, pews, hymnals and other items of liturgy) and responding to the requirements of the Minister. Tom Rourk notes that duties also included rousing somnambulant parishioners and disciplining errant choristers. While we will not be beating choir members or chastising those who might be snoring, we will be continuing to perform our traditional function.

**Environmental Action Committee News:** The Environmental Action Committee (EAC) last year sponsored the Carlisle Winter Farmer's Market for monthly Saturday mornings in Union Hall. The goal was to support local, sustainable food and crafts year round. Thanks to a successful winter season, the Farmer's Market group was able to contribute \$250 from their table fees to the EAC. The EAC staffed a table each month selling fair trade coffee and chocolate, local honey, and other items, along with having the "coffee concession." The Winter Market will continue this year - upcoming dates are: November 26, December 17, January 21, February 18, March 10 and April 21.

On September 15th the EAC toured Sweet Autumn Farm to see the home and farming operation created by Leslie Thomas and Katharine Endicott, which earned a LEED Silver certification. The EAC members, along with Rep. Cory Atkins, heard from the builder about insulation, solar energy, Clivus composting toilets, and farming. **Social Action Committee News:** A message from Julia Lyons about her involvement in the Virginia Service Project: *Note: Julia and her sister Chrissy are second generation FRSers. Their parents are Helen and John. Appalachian Volunteers is a Boston College program. Look on the SAC bulletin board in Union Hall for two photos from Julia's trip.*

"Entering my senior year at Boston College, I have now participated in four service trips with the Appalachia Volunteers program during spring break or in late summer. These trips have taken me to a depressed coal mining town in Pennsylvania (Waynesburg), an unincorporated "holler" in the mountains of West Virginia devastated by natural gas mining and mountain top removal (Jacksonburg), and twice to the impoverished Eastern Shore town of Exmore, Virginia, where the locals live under the thumb of the wealthy, ocean-front residents. Each of these experiences has been incredibly eye-opening and rewarding. In August, I returned to Exmore for the second time, to help run a day camp for the local children, held in a local church's parking lot. In a community only three hours from our nation's capital, extended families live in dilapidated homes that consist of only one or two rooms, and lack running water, heat, and electricity. A trench extended along each road serves as a sewer, and each home is equipped with an outhouse.

Our purpose for the week was to provide the children with positive role models, while keeping them out of trouble. In reality, we learn just as much from the children as they do from us. Most of these children will never have the opportunity to leave the Eastern Shore. We hope to plant a seed in them of the importance of education. Our local contact, Mama Jane, has told us many times that these children look forward to the Boston College students' arrival. The children are unbelievably caring and kind, despite their circumstances.

I would like to thank the Social Action Committee for their support, which helped us provide the children with breakfast and lunch during our visit, and supplies such as sidewalk chalk, jump ropes, and basketballs that they can continue to play with throughout the year. It has been an incredible opportunity to spend time with these children, and it has helped me realize my goal of working in social action in the future."

### Message from the Minister

A friend of mine made a comment in conversation. “I must spend half an hour every day just putting things where they go,” she said. My initial reaction was, “That’s a lot of time out of every day devoted to putting things away.” Then I came to my senses and realized that I easily spend more than half an hour a day putting things away and that’s just basics, like dishes and groceries and laundry and recycling. I spend a lot of time putting stuff away at FRS as well. Putting things where they go is not something I intrinsically value, but I do like being able to find things when I need them. So I began observing when I put stuff away and when I avoided putting things in order. For one thing, it is easier to put things away when there is a known place to put them (duh!). It is easier when putting things away is routine, a ritual of daily living. It is easier when I acknowledge that I am going to spend time doing it and don’t assume I have better things to do.

In my quest of a more ordered life, I started by redoing the kitchen cupboards in the parsonage. It took more time than I expected. I weeded out what I haven’t been using. I made trips to pick up cup hooks and shelf liner and dividers. I got the spices organized. It became easier to put things away. The following week included a wedding and a sermon to prepare for guest preaching, and meetings to attend. The kitchen cabinets may be as far as I get this summer, and now my effort is to stay ahead of kitchen entropy. I learned something about changing my habits. It takes effort, time, attention, focus and repetition. And it is good to derive some satisfaction from the doing of it as well as from the having done it. I have accomplished more at other times in my life, but this bit of nesting has readied me for the busy times ahead and, in fact, is helping me put away my summer pace and move into the excitement of the new church year. ## **Message from the Student Minister**

When I was a sophomore in college, I decided that I was going to run a marathon. I based my training on a schedule that had been put together at the advent of the modern era of popular marathoning. The London marathon was run for the first time in 1981; to prepare first-time runners, a columnist for the Times of London had assembled a manageable-looking table of the minutes you had to run each day for three months leading up to it if you wanted to be able to complete it. I started hitting the treadmill four times a week. I watched dreck like MTV at the gym while I did my best to keep up an eight-minute-per-mile speed.

Around finals time, and then again in the summer, I hit a wall and could not find the time or the stamina to cross the one hour barrier. I set a personal record in the 5K distance but 40K (a marathon) seemed perpetually out of reach.

Not much changed in this pattern until I left college and was living in Berkeley. I read a New York Times piece about interspersing your runs with periods of walking. It claimed this was an effective method for increasing the distances you could run with safety and comfort. People can make fun of me (and many have) for getting drawn into watching sports easily. But getting caught up in a soccer tournament on the fields I was running around at Berkeley High was how I turned the corner as a distance runner. There was a Korean league having its playoffs one afternoon that I just could not look away from. I kept walking and running around the track until they were done. Before I knew it, I had been there for two hours- adding the distance to and from my house put me over a half-marathon for the day.

Now, when I say “it’s a marathon not a sprint”, what I mean is that you get to walk in some parts. This summer I did a bit of mental walking- I read novels instead of history books and listened to comedy podcasts instead of NPR. For the first time since I matriculated at divinity school, my brain began to ask for more intellectual content instead of less. That’s how I know it was a good rest and that I am ready to return to school and church life refreshed and renewed. I hope that you each got some time to mentally walk it out this summer, too.
