## Message from the Director of Religious Education

We look forward to a new church year with the theme of Unitarian Universalism. In the upcoming year we will find concrete ways of *doing* UU faith based activities. Social justice, environmental issues, welcoming diversity, being nice to all people...we will find many hands-on ways to help our children and youth to live an ethical and spiritual life.

On a rather more mundane note, the church has a new database system where confidential information can be kept secret and useful quasi-public information, such as e-mails, can be kept up to date. When all the data is entered we will be able to make lists for teachers to communicate with their students, print correctly addressed envelopes, or any perform any other administrative task involving groups of church people. This is a good thing. Having multiple places for cell phone numbers and e-mail data has been painful. I look forward to the day when I and others can just generate useful accurate lists with a few key strokes. Sadly to get to this sweet administrative nirvana requires hours of tedious data entry. I'm about three quarters the way through and looking forward to the grunt work portion being completed soon. The Iconcmo.com software is really very powerful and user friendly. We are all very grateful to the Technology Committee and Susan Emmons and John James who have brought this project to fruition.

One fact became obvious when the RE Committee looked carefully at the K-8 students for this upcoming year, and that is our grade groupings should change. We plan to have the Nursery for babies and toddlers, a Preschool group within the Nursery for 3-5 year olds, and separate classes for K-1 and 2-4. The Junior Youth Group will be grades 5-8, noting that we do not as of today have any 8<sup>th</sup> graders. I think this a good plan!

## What happened at FRS this summer

Your church on the hill was a busy place during July and August: On Old Home Day, the FRS float won a special prize in the parade in the historic category. Dick and Carolyn Shohet pulled the hay wagon with their tractor, Kathy Booth costumed participants in the eras of 1812 and 1912, and the 2012 representatives rode as they were. Alison Saylor coordinated the float project that involved call and response shouting and some serious candy-tossing. Diane Miller set up a table in the front foyer where we handed out rainbow flags and brochures about the church.

During July, due to construction at the school site, the Carlisle Public Schools held summer school here in Union Hall and in the Red Balloon space. It was a treat to have young voices in the building, and comportment was exemplary. The Vice-Principal confessed that they wanted to come back, even though their own campus will be available next year.

Thanks to a special gift, a new screen porch was built at the parsonage. A small entry area ("mud-room") from the garage and linking to the kitchen was also built. Thanks to John Barber for the construction, to Karla Johnson and Diane Miller for design help and to Ann James for overseeing the project for Buildings and Grounds. With the help of some volunteer painters, the job should be complete soon.

Repair work began on the steeple on August 22. We welcome back our long-term steeplejack George Burgess. The work will involve repairs inside and out and painting. Look up when you pass by and you may see activity on the steeple.

Thanks to the town, the CPA committee and the selectmen, to FRS parish committee members John Lyons and Eric Darling and to legal consultant Greg Peterson for the work on getting CPA funding and the required Historic Preservation agreement application. Also thanks to Stew Roberts for submitting the initial application, and to Bryan Sorrows for his Town Meeting presentation on the CPA funding. All their hard work has helped us get a safer, stronger and drier steeple!

In early August, a wedding was celebrated in the Sanctuary. These were non-members who chose our church after coming to a Sunday service because we were so "warm and welcoming." **Year-end wrap-up from our Treasurer:** Enclosed you will find the fiscal year-end report but I thought some explanation might be helpful. First of all, thank you for your generosity in completing your pledges for 2011-12. Once again we had an incredible fulfillment rate---- 99%!! This was particularly appreciated in a year when we experienced the unanticipated loss of over \$22K in cell tower rental revenue. As you can see though, with an increase in contributions, a tightening of our collective belts, and significant savings in number of areas, including energy, we ended up in a fairly positive position. While it might appear that we had a positive cash flow, looks can be deceiving. The proceeds from the incredibly successful auction which raised over \$24K (thank you again!) were taken in the 2010-11 fiscal year, but half were budgeted for the 2012-13 (non-auction) year. In the end, we do have some financial cushion as we enter the next year, but we operated at a deficit of approximately \$4K.

**Solar panels for the FRS ?** After a unanimous vote by the Environmental Action Committee (EAC) to pursue an investigation of the feasibility and desirability for the FRS to have solar photovoltaic panels on its South-facing roofs, the EAC began to investigate this possibility this summer. We found out that solar photovoltaic installations are very hot right now owing in part to State and Federal tax incentives and the State Solar Renewable Energy Credit (SREC) program. In fact, two members of our committee, Dave Erickson and Greg Rocco, recently have had solar panel arrays installed on their residences under this incentive program. Although the FRS would not be eligible for the tax credits, private installation companies are eligible and can pass those savings on to the FRS in contractual leasing arrangements or other energy contracts known as Power Purchasing Agreements, or PPA's. A typical PPA, for instance, would be a no-money-up-front contract for 10 or 20 years whereby the installing company puts its own solar panels on the FRS roof(s) and then sells solar electricity to the FRS. Right now the incentives are so good that a typical contract might offer solar electricity for LESS than the CURRENT NStar utility rate at a guaranteed price for 10 or 20 years. The EAC was advised, however, that the deal breaker in such an endeavor might be in obtaining permission from the Historic District Commission (HDC) for such an installation. So we decided to try for an early informal HDC opinion before we spent a lot of time and effort on getting all the necessary FRS approvals. Susan Emmons, as

part of her presentations to the HDC for the infinity garden and the new parsonage porch, presented some mock up photos to the HDC that show what a photo panel array might look like from the street. An informal polling revealed that some members of the board were surely opposed but probably a majority had an open mind on the question. An official ruling would have to wait, however, until the church has a contract proposal from an installer.

Given that uncertainty the EAC then made a presentation to the Parish Committee (PC) on the reason for wanting to do this and what would be involved. The reason, of course, is wanting to reduce the carbon footprint of the FRS and wanting to be a beacon in the community exemplifying that goal. The PC, while supportive, advised a go-slow approach that might take two or three years. Soon after church begins in September, however, the EAC would like to give the congregation a presentation on the project. The EAC recommends that the FRS move quickly to capture the presently available incentives. The tax portion of these incentives may be expiring Dec. 31, so if the FRS congregation wants to take advantage of the rebates it needs to ask the PC and Building and Grounds (B&G) committees to move with uncommon speed.
